Woodinville Heritage Society 2016-17 Programs

The Woodinville Heritage Society has wound up a successful season of free monthly programs scheduled by board member Deanna Arnold-Frady from November through May.

The public programs covered a wide range of topics: the early history of Redmond, vintage cars, World War I in Washington state, origin of a secret society of miners, Christmas traditions, and the 145-year history of pioneer schools in the Woodinville area.

Deanna experimented with scheduling the programs on Saturday mornings during the darker winter months, while offering the fall and spring programs on Wednesday evenings. The

setting was the Brightwater Education Center on Highway 9, which offered ample meeting space and parking. The one exception was the December program, held at the museum.

A new schedule of 2016-17 topics is being assembled by Deanna. She has also surveyed program attendees about their preference for Saturday morning or Wednesday evening programs. We hope members will let us know their thoughts.

We want to provide the community an informative museum experience, educational programming and a repository for our rich history. As we go forward, we would be delighted to have your help.


Here's how you can contribute, whether it's two hours a week, two days a month, or just the occasional drop-in experience.

Kenmore Heritage Society Asks for Help: St. Edwards Seminary

The Wash. State Parks & Recreation Commission more shoreline acreage to the park grounds in is facing a decision on a land swap with a developer, Kevin Daniels, who proposes to invest \$50 million to bring the Saint Edward Seminary Building back to life as a national-parks style hotel. The 1931 brick building and grounds just west of Juanita Drive in Kenmore was sold to the state in 1977 and is on the State Heritage Register and National Register of Historic Places.

Although the grounds are used for recreation extensively, the building has been allowed to deteriorate. Daniels has received national awards for his restoration of Seattle's Union Station and the Cadillac Hotel in Pioneer Square.

A decision on a proposed land trade, adding

exchange for the property on which the building sits, is expected this summer after an environmental review. Community discussion has resulted in several meetings, including a June 1 gathering at Kenmore Community Club at 7 pm.

The Kenmore Heritage Society is suggesting that interested people can send a letter to Wash. State Parks & Recreation Commission, P.O. Box 42650. Olympia, WA 98504 or email Commission@parks. wa.gov. Also, there is a petition of support for the project at www.change.org. (at the top of the Home page, find the Search command and enter "Kenmore seminary").

Phillips is a new member, while Kraft and Malinowski were re-elected. Phillips succeeds Judy Moore, who was a longtime board member including service as Heritage Society treasurer.

Phillips is a senior vice-president with Morgan Stanley (financial services). Raised in the Wenatchee Valley area, he graduated from the Univ. of Wash. with a degree in finance. He served as a Navy pilot 1969-72, including service in Vietnam.

After seven years in the restaurant business in California, Phillips and his family returned to this state and live in the Laurel Hills area. His wife, Robin, is a teacher at Bear Creek Elementary. They have three children.

Phillips assumed his role as a board member in May. Following a bylaws revision last year, board members now serve three-year terms. On a rotation basis, three terms will expire each year, so that the remaining six board members continue the nucleus of a stable board.

The board then elects officers from within itself to serve the Heritage Society for the coming year (2016-2017). That will occur June 9 at the regular board meeting (second Thursday of each month).

Meeting of the Six North End Heritage Groups: March 16

Heritage members attending were Loida Hawkinson, Kirkland; Suzi Freeman, Woodinville; Glen Languth, Kirkland; Joe Townsend, Redmond; Don Sparling, Bothell; Mary Lampson, Duvall; and Pat Pierce, Bothell.

First topic of discussion was how to find younger people to participate. Joe brought up a site, volunteermatch.org, as a source to use. Redmond also has a constant notice regarding help needed for Past Perfect input. Joe also suggested we should be using the multi-use version of Past Perfect.

Digitizing newspapers is a current project with many of the groups. Redmond is working on the Sammamish Paper. Bothell, Kenmore, and Woodinville have worked together on the Bothell paper, which is close to being finished.

Mary Lampson says they have some old Duvall Papers. They will look into having them digitized. Joe gave us a list of what they do to draw people in.

They have a committee to come up with programs.

They do "rack cards" for local businesses.

They have an extensive media list.

Programs announcements are listed in paper. Posters.

Facebook.

Non-members are asked to pay \$5 donations.

Duvall is doing a Readers Theatre. The society comes up with an era, such as WWI; then find letters or articles pertaining to the subject. Duvall is working with the drama department at the high school. They hope that this will attract younger people to join their group.

Discussion was brought up on oral histories. Some of us still use cassette tapes, which do not have a long shelf life. A digital recorder is the best equipment to use now. It was suggested that information be saved to a thumb drive.

Audacity Nuwave is a good way to record information and then edit it in the computer.

Redmond has Historic Seattle "digging deeper" into their collections. They will host the next group meeting in September, 2016.
