Members and Family Enjoy Oscar Roloff Stories and Photos From a Bygone Era

In March, Heritage Society members shared more than a dozen of **Oscar Roloff's** stories and photos about Woodinville's hermits, its law breakers and people who made us laugh and made us sad.

We were especially honored to have in our audience his widow, **Elaine**, and family members **Ashley Hill, Raina Roloff Torres and Luis Torres**.

Oscar was a war correspondent and a nationally renowned and inexhaustible journalist whose stories and photographs have been published by UPI and many other major news agencies. Oscar wrote about his life and the lives of many residents in and around Woodinville from the 1970s until his death.

Some of the stories we brought to life that day began with the tin cow and calf that once stood in the valley near Hollywood School and how Paul Waterman and Gary Vig decided one morning that the "landscape lacked something ... such as a cow or two." We told the story of Henry Blum, a gentle hermit, who lived on 5 acres of swampland near Woodinville and why he made his own concoction for coffee from the horse-tail plant. We read about Harry Tracy, a convict, and his brother-in-law Dave Merrill who fled an Oregon prison, headed northwards, ending up in "our" valley and while near a Spokane wheat field boasted, "I'll never be taken alive," shot and killed himself. And we read about Grandma Pe-

terson's pioneer life along the Sammamish River and how the boat skipper told her how many passengers wanted one of her home cooked meals by the number of toots of his whistle. Our last story was the funniest - *The Woodinville out-house caper* about Francis Rivers' desire to keep a one-holer on his front lawn as a conversation piece.

We have boxes and boxes of Oscar's writings. It is our intention to share more of his stories in the fall. It will be another fun and enlightening meeting that shouldn't be missed.

Have You Seen What's New at the Museum?

The **Woodinville Heritage Museum at the DeYoung House** winds up its winter schedule on Sunday, May 6, open from 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm.

On display will be laminated Woodinville-area maps from 1908 and the 1930s, 1950s

and 1970s. Viewers can see how their current properties looked during those eras. An early-day radio will play background music reminiscent of those eras.

Beginning with Memorial Day weekend, the museum moves to a weekly schedule: every Sunday from 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm through Labor Day weekend in September.

Beginning June 3, a special exhibit will highlight at least eight general stores that served Woodinville-area residents from 1880 onward. These include the Neilsen, Teegarden, Hollywood, Homestead, Miller, DeYoung, Mack, Hinman and Rongve stores. Photos and artifacts will be on display.

The museum's handsome, two-story DeYoung House features furnishings that date to the 1930s and earlier. The house was built on Woodinville's main street in

1932 and was occupied by John and Ellen DeYoung and their six children for 30-plus years. The house was moved in 1973 to its present location at 14121 NE 171st St.

The home's kitchen and bedrooms contain various articles and furnishings that belonged to the DeYoungs. Other rooms offer special exhibits that will change regularly throughout the summer and early fall, including quilts made by Woodinville pioneer Susan Woodin and other early quilters.
