Lake Leota History to be Featured at the Museum

The Woodinville Heritage Museum will host Lake Leota resident/historian Marcella Maddex offering stories and history of the lake at a free program Saturday, Feb. 8, at 10 am at the museum's DeYoung House, 14121 NE 171st St.

Lake Leota is located along the south side of the Woodinville-Duvall Road just east of the White Stallion intersection. The history includes an 1891 document signed by U.S. President Benjamin Harrison, conveying the lake to Clinton West for the sum of 10 gold pieces.

Maddex will discuss the book she and fellow resident Verna Zander compiled about the history of the lake from an 1880s mill pond, through its 1902 name of Summit Lake, to the 1930s renaming by

Edward Brady when he developed 24 lots around the water and called it Lake Leota Farms in honor of his wife, Leota.

Slides that illustrate the lake's history will be shown by Jim Stiles. The Maddex/Zander book originally was researched and written to recognize the Lake Leota Community Club's colorful 50-year history.

"This program is another in a series the museum offers to acquaint residents and friends with Woodinville's diverse communities, many of which date back more than 120 years," said Woodinville Heritage Society president Rick Chatterton.

Did you know that:

1876 - The first public transportation for Woodinville was the steamboat "Mud Hen" as it traveled along then Squak Slough from Lake Washington to Issaquah. (But it made only the one trip up-river before getting entangled in grasses growing on the slough).

1887 - Woodinville got its first railway service with the Seattle, Lake Shore and Eastern Railroad.

Circa 1912 - Electricity first came to Woodinville.

1974 - Woodinville got its first signal light (at 140th Avenue NE and NE 175th Street).

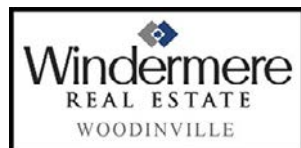
